HYMN OF THE WEEK: O worship the Lord...

From the Old Testament: 1 Chronicles 16:29 - Give unto the LORD the glory due unto his name: bring an offering, and come before him: worship the LORD in the beauty of holiness. (KJV)

...So sang the young Levite priest Asaph, David's musical director, and his brethren on the day of the entrance into Jerusalem of the Ark of the Covenant, God's presence amongst His people Israel. This was a new liturgical composition, incorporating elements of Psalms 96, 105 & 106, and appears to form the inspiration for John Monsell's verses sung today.

In keeping with the sentiments of grace and hospitality we encounter in today's scripture readings, David preceded this Ark celebration by blessing Israel, and giving each person a loaf of bread, piece of meat, and flagon of wine. (1 Chron.16:3)

We are more used to the idea of God being worshipped in the heavenly courts, alongside Christ, "one like the Son of man", as foreseen in the visions of Daniel (Dan.7:9-14). We can offer him no physical gifts, like those of the magi, but can simply worship him in truth, lowliness and loving obedience, rejoicing in his grace and hospitality in exchanging our fear, trembling and tears for hope, trust and joy.

According to Matthew Henry's Concise Commentary: When Christ finished his work on earth, and was received into his glory in heaven, the church began to sing a new song unto him, and to bless his name. His apostles and evangelists showed forth his salvation among the heathen, his wonders among all people. All the earth is here summoned to worship the Lord. We must worship him in the beauty of holiness, as God in Christ, reconciling the world unto himself.

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' And Jesus said to her, 'Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come.' His mother said to the servants. 'Do whatever he tells vou.' Now standing there were six stone water-jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, 'Fill the jars with water.' And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, 'Now draw some out. and take it to the chief steward.' So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, 'Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now.' Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

Most of all thank You for the hope which Jesus brings.


This earthly life is a whisper in the light of eternity and Jesus is the key to that eternal life.

History Corner... the second St John's Church



In August 1867, just ten months after the demise of The Round Church building, the second St John's Church was ready! Once again, the clergy, choir and the local Great and The Good gathered in the old iron round church, this time to ceremonially process, with banners flying, into the new church, as they sang "Christ is made the sure foundation". Mr Dyer, the author of "St John the Evangelist - The First Hundred Years", describes this church building as "the little brick church on the hill". The Reverend Vaughan and his assistant priests administered both Christ Church and St John's churches for the next 15 years. We are told that in 1873, the clergy team of four priests and two deacons served a population of 6,000.

Unfortunately, on the eve of Advent Sunday, 30th November 1878, this second St John's Church burned down. The fire was attributed to a gas stove which had been left burning there, due to the usual heating system being temporarily out of order. The Rev'd Robert Walker, who chronicled the building of the third St John's, later wrote: "The little church and its quiet services were dear to many, and the sudden sight of the blackened and still smouldering ruin drew forth many a tear in the early hours of that Advent morning. But when from the standing point of 1886 we look back upon the ruin, it would be difficult to deny that the sorrow was indeed a blessing, for from the ashes of the little building there has arisen a stately church worthy... of the Worship of God, and fit to be the Parish Church of a large and important district".

Tomorrow, 25th January, the Church celebrates the Conversion of Saint Paul.

Indeed, what happened to a young man called Saul on the road to Damascus has become a byword for all instant conversions - what is known as a 'damascene' moment. Saul was a devout Jew, a Pharisee, a student of Gamaliel and a fierce critic of the followers of Jesus, then a very new sect on the religious scene.

On his way to Damascus to start a purge of Christians in that city, he was blinded by a bright light and heard a voice saying, 'Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?' He asked the identity of the voice, and was told: 'Jesus, whom you are persecuting'. Stunned by the experience, he followed further instructions which led him to a Christian man in Damascus, who prayed with him. As he did, Saul's sight was restored.

The experience convinced Paul that Jesus - crucified in Jerusalem four or five years earlier - was in fact the Messiah and had risen from the dead. After a period of instruction, Saul was baptised and took the name Paul. At first, some Christians were wary about the reality of his conversion, but over a period of time he was accepted and indeed eventually recognised as an 'apostle', a 'special messenger' of Jesus Christ.

His intellectual stature and leadership gifts quickly marked him out, and within a few years he became a leading figure in the emerging Christian Church, preaching and founding churches all over the Middle East, largely of Gentile converts. He was eventually martyred in Rome, probably in 65 A.D.

Paul was the first intellectual of the Christian Church, the man who was able to set the events of the life and teaching of Jesus, and especially His death and resurrection, into a coherent theology, with its roots very clearly in the Jewish faith of his own upbringing.

Many people think of Paul as a rather negative, narrow misogynist, but even a quick reading of his letters actually reveals a person of great warmth, who evoked enormous affection and devotion from others. 'You would have plucked out your eyes and given them to me!' he writes to the Christians at Galatia. As for the charge



that Paul disliked women, even a quick read of his letters will reveal how large a role women played in his churches. In terms of the first century, St Paul was a dangerous liberal! So, all in all, the amazing Paul of Tarsus deserves a bit of celebrating on 25th January.

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
