HYMN OF THE WEEK: "The Head that Once was Crowned with Thorns", by Thomas Kelly, sung by Sally from the choir

Thomas Kelly's words are built around two passages from the New Testament: Hebrews 2:10 and 2 Timothy 2:12. It is possible that Kelly derived his first line from a poem by John Bunyan, which includes the lines:

"The head that once was crowned with thorns Shall now with glory shine; That heart that broken was with scorns Shall flow with life divine."

Erik Routley, the hymnologist and musicologist, described this hymn as "perhaps the finest of all hymns – Thomas Kelly has here comprehended the whole Gospel, and he tells of the Good News and of the mysterious mercy by which we may lay hold of it" ('Hymns and Human Life', 1952).

Thomas Kelly (1769-1854) was ordained into the Church of Ireland in 1792. He became well known as a preacher, but the Archbishop of Dublin eventually prohibited him from preaching in the diocese because of the evangelical emphasis of his message. As a result, Kelly preached as an independent minister in two unconsecrated buildings in Dublin. Those who followed him were known as 'The Kellyites'.

Like John Wesley, he planted church congregations in other towns, became active in many good causes, and was particularly esteemed by the poor. Like Charles Wesley, he was a prolific hymn writer, penning some 765 hymns. Info from The Methodist Church Website

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Acts 1.15-17,21-26

In those days Peter stood up among the believers (together the crowd numbered about one hundred and twenty people). He said, 'Friends, the scripture had to be fulfilled, which the Holy Spirit through David foretold concerning Judas, who became a guide for those who arrested Jesus – for he was numbered among us and was allotted his share in this ministry.

So one of the men who have accompanied us throughout the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from us – one of these must become a witness with us to his resurrection.'

So they proposed two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also known as Justus, and Matthias. Then they prayed and said, 'Lord, you know everyone's heart. Show us which one of these two you have chosen to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place.' And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias; and he was added to the eleven apostles.

Sermon

The Creed

Let us declare our faith in God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

All We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate:

he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son,

who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Jesus Christ, keep the Church in the unity of the Spirit and in the bond of peace, and bring the whole created order to worship at your feet; for you are alive and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. All Amen.

Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of Saint John the Evangelist, Saint Peter, Mary the Mother of God, and all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord;

by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever.

What a celebration there must have been when Jesus returned to his Father – and what a celebration also when the Holy Spirit so powerfully descended.


It is the story of those 'simple' disciples who were scared and hiding one day, and bold and outspoken the next, that speaks to me of something outstanding happening.

14th May - St Matthias, the replacement apostle

If you're saying to yourself, 'Who?' you'll be in good company. Friday, May 14th, was the feast day of Saint Matthias the Apostle, and in describing him thus we have said just about all there is to know about him. He gets just one mention in the Bible, in the first chapter of Acts, immediately prior to the day of Pentecost, where it tells us that he was elected to take the place, in the ranks of the twelve apostles, recently vacated by the betrayer Judas Iscariot.

Eusebius, in the fourth century, says in his history of the apostolic era that Matthias was one of the 70 disciples sent out by Jesus (Luke 10:1), and that seems

reasonable. When it was necessary to fill the vacancy among the apostles it would be natural to turn to someone who had followed Jesus from earlier years, as well as being a witness of the resurrection. Two names were suggested and prayed over. When they did, 'the lot fell on Matthias'.

Casting lots to fill vacancies on committees or councils, or even to appoint bishops, might seem to us to be rather risky. The Victorian preacher Campbell Morgan even suggested that the 11 acted in haste and pre-empted God's choice of Saul, later known as Paul, who at that time was busy persecuting the Church, arresting Christians and having them thrown into prison. He hadn't yet travelled the Damascus Road.

Be that as it may, Matthias was elected, and for us he can stand for all those excellent, consistent, reliable and faithful servants of Christ who never make a headline, not even in the parish magazine. Yet still he was chosen because he could be a 'witness', and so are we.

Doubtless he fulfilled that responsibility admirably, without, as we say, 'setting the Thames on fire'. Let's salute him today - the 'Unknown Apostle'.





Have you noticed that the St John's sanctuary bell tower is different to the architect's original drawing for it: it's a rather sweet mini version of the church!




