HYMN OF THE WEEK: Christ whose glory fills the skies...

Of the many great hymns by **Charles Wesley**, this is considered one of his best. It is a glorious hymn to Christ – the "Dawn from on high" in the words of the Benedictus (Luke 1:68-79).

Originally titled "A Morning Hymn", it begins with the contrast between light and night. In **verse one** the vivid images of "Sun," "Dayspring" and "Daystar" are personified as Christ.

In **verse two**, Wesley uses the first words of each line to tell the story of redemption. Our human plight is described as "Dark," "Unaccompanied," and "Joyless." The next two lines beginning with "till" represent our hope for salvation. Finally, after the hope is given and the work is done, line six describes the cheer which comes from our redemption through Jesus Christ.

In **verse three** we enjoy the uplifting description of the "Radiancy divine", Christ, "scattering our unbelief" - having redeemed us from our sin. Wesley ramps up the excitement with the words "more and more" - we can never see enough of this "Radiancy divine".

Scripture references include John 1:9 concerning the "true light" in verse one. "Sun of Righteousness" comes from Malachi 4:2, and "Day-star" from 2 Peter 1:19. By referencing Christ as the "Sun of Righteousness," it has been suggested that this is a way of "Christianising" old sun-worshipping religious instincts, in the same way that old pagan sites were often repurposed as Christian sites.

"Christ, whose glory fills the sky" also promotes the idea that the resurrected and ascended Christ is no longer limited to one place or time, but is with us always and everywhere.

Dear friends

As we reach the terrible milestone of 100,000 deaths from COVID-19, we invite everyone in our nation to pause as we reflect on the enormity of this pandemic.

100,000 isn't just an abstract figure. Each number is a person: someone we loved and someone who loved us. We also believe that each of these people was known to God and cherished by God.

We write to you then in consolation, but also in encouragement, and ultimately in the hope of Jesus Christ. The God who comes to us in Jesus knew grief and suffering himself. On the cross, Jesus shares the weight of our sadness.

We therefore encourage everyone who is feeling scared, or lost or isolated to cast their fears on God. We also know that poorer communities, minority ethnic communities and those living with disabilities have been afflicted disproportionately and cry out for the healing of these inequalities. During this pandemic, we encourage everyone to do all they can to live within the guidelines and constraints given by government following the advice of the Chief Medical Officer and Chief Scientific Adviser. We show our commitment, care and love for one another by ensuring we do everything we can to stop the virus spreading.

None of this is easy. Very many of us are experiencing isolation, loneliness, anxiety and despondency like never before. Many people have lost their livelihoods. Our economy struggles. Also, the necessary restrictions we live with have also prevented us from being alongside loved ones as they died, or even at their graveside. All grief profoundly affects us, but this pandemic grief is so hard.

Therefore, we need to support each other. We do this by following the guidelines. But we also do it by reaching out to each other with care and kindness.

One thing we can all do is pray. We hope it is some consolation to know that the church prays for the life of our nation every day. Whether you're someone of faith, or not, we invite you to call on God in prayer. Starting on 1 February we invite you to set aside time every evening to pray, particularly at 6pm each day. More than ever, this is a time when we need to love each other. Prayer is an expression of love. A number of resources will be made available at www.ChurchofEngland.org/PrayerForTheNation.

Finally, we write of hope. We are grateful for the hope we have because of the service of our NHS and social care staff. What a blessing and lifeline for our nation. We are grateful for the service given in local communities by clergy, other frontline workers and so many good neighbours. We are grateful for the hope of the vaccine. It is a testimony to the God-given wisdom and gifts of scientists and researchers. We urge everyone to take the vaccine as soon as it is offered to you.

Most of all, we have hope because God raised Jesus from the dead. This is the Christian hope that we will be celebrating at Easter. We live in the hope that we will share in his resurrection. Death doesn't have the last word. In God's kingdom every tear will be wiped away.

Please be assured of our prayers. Please join us.

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, Mary and Joseph brought Jesus up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord. (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons.'

Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

'Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace,

according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,

a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel.'

And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed – and a sword will pierce your own soul too.'

There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of

Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. All Praise to you, O Christ.

The Presentation of Christ in the Temple, by Fra Angelico (c.1395 – 1455)


Tomorrow, 1st February, Brigid of Ireland is commemorated


Historical facts about this first abbess of Kildare (died c. 525) may be scarce, but her 'Lives', written from the 7th century, tell many anecdotes and miracles which over the centuries have become deeply rooted in Irish folklore. Brigid came from a village near Kildare, of parents of humble origin, and is said to have been baptised by Patrick, becoming a nun at an early age. She is credited with founding the monastery of Kildare, a powerful influence for Christianity in Ireland.

The miracles attributed to Brigid show her to have been a woman of great compassion and generosity. There are stories of how she could multiply food, especially butter, for the poor.

Other stories tell of her changing water to beer, in order to satisfy the thirst of unexpected visitors. Even her cows gave milk three times the same day, enabling some visiting bishops to have enough to drink.

Brigid's following grew rapidly in Ireland, where it became second only to that of Patrick. In England, there were at least 19 ancient church dedications in her honour (the most famous is St Bride's Fleet Street). There is also St Bride's Bay, Dyfed, which underlines the strong connection between Irish and Welsh Christianity. St Brigid is patron of poets, blacksmiths, and healers. She is usually depicted with a cow lying at her feet, which recalls her phase as a nun/cow-herd.





By the time a third church building was required, the St John's congregation had become more independent, and in 1879 Rev'd Vaughan set the wheels in motion for the creation of the separate parish of Upper St Leonards. The burnt "little brick church" was repaired for use *pro tem* whilst a new and larger church was literally built around it. Mr (later Sir) Arthur Blomfield was the architect. The chancel of the new church was consecrated on 25th July 1881 by the Bishop, allowing the new parish of Upper St Leonards to officially come into being, with the Rev'd H.D. Jones as its first Rector. Fundraising continued, to enable the rest of the large structure to be completed, including a tower and spire. Generous gifts funded the baptistery, pulpit and chancel screen. In 1883, the little brick "church within a church" was finally dismantled,

much of it being repurposed as flooring for the new church, and on 29th September of that year the new church was first used in its own right.




Everyone at St Johns has helped us to receive the **Bronze Eco Church Award.** This is great considering there is only one other church with this achievement in Hastings. A Rocha, the international Christian environmental charity behind the scheme, recently announced the 1,000th award which was for Hereford Cathedral, so we are in good company. You may be wondering what this award means and some may be thinking perhaps we could do even better and go for Silver or Gold.

To achieve our Bronze Award we completed an online Eco Survey about how well we at St Johns are doing at caring for God's earth. The survey asked about five key areas: worship and teaching; management of church buildings; management of church land; community and global engagement; lifestyle. Our answers to the questions earned us points. Questions included: How often does the church pray for environmental issues? Does the church electricity supply come from renewable resources? Are our toilets twinned? Do we maintain an area of land for native wild flowers?

Some issues are quite difficult to change, however we can all do simple things like turning off lights when they are not needed, offering lifts to church and walking when we can. The idea is to challenge ourselves to improve, and repeat the survey in a year or so.


