#### **HYMN OF THE WEEK:** Forty days and forty nights

Written by George Hunt Smyttan, clergyman, author and poet, Forty Days and Forty nights started out as a nine verse poem, published in the Penny Post in March 1856, under the title "Poetry for Lent; As sorrowful, yet always rejoicing". The Rev'd Francis Pott, who had to resign from his parish near Biggleswade due to deafness, adapted the hymn for one of his own collections. Pott also wrote original hymns, including 'Angel voices, ever singing'. The hymn's German tune Heinlein, meaning 'Out of the deep', is a seventeenth century composition, probably by Martin Herbst.

Based on Matthew 4:1-11, the hymn recalls the temptation of Christ in the wilderness, and goes on to exhort him to aid us in resisting our own worldly temptations. "Because he himself was tested by what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested." (Hebrews 2:18)

with joyful hearts and minds we bless you for your mercy and join with saints and angels for ever praising you and saying:

All Holy, holy, holy Lord,
God of power and might,

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying:
Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.
Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

All Christ has died:

Christ is risen:

Christ will come again.

And so, Father, calling to mind his death on the cross, his perfect sacrifice made once for the sins of the whole world; rejoicing in his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption.

As we offer you this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, we bring before you this bread and this cup and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you.

Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of Saint John the Evangelist, Saint Peter, Mary the Mother of God, and all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord;

by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever.



Saturday, 27<sup>th</sup> February, is the "lesser festival" day of priest and poet **George Herbert** (1593-1633), writer of many popular and inspiring hymns, including 'Let all the World in Every Corner Sing', 'Teach me, my God and King', and 'King of Glory, King of Peace'. From a young age, Herbert wrote religious poetry, and for many students of English Literature he is the finest devotional poet, whose work has wide appeal to those both inside and outside the Anglican Church and the Christian faith.

George Herbert struggled for most of his life with conflicting desires. On the one hand, he was a gifted scholar who shone at school and university and for whom a glittering political career seemed to beckon. On the other, he was conscious of

a constant leaning towards a calling to ordination as a priest. This persistent inner turmoil was the source and inspiration of much of his poetry.

Finally, at the age of 36, he embraced the priesthood and accepted the living of the small, insignificant parish of Fuggleston-cum-Bemerton in Wiltshire. Here he found inner peace at last, serving God and the local community, and here his poetic talent was able to flourish. Sadly, this tranquillity lasted for only three years, brought to an end by his early death just short of his 40th birthday.

As well as his many poems and hymns, Herbert was a prolific source of "proverbs" and one-liners, still recognisable and appropriate some 400 years on...

He who cannot forgive breaks the bridge over which he himself must pass.

Prayer should be the key of the day and the lock of the night.

Thou who hast given so much to me, give me one more thing... a grateful heart!

Storms make the oak grow deeper roots.

Life is half spent before we know what it is.

Where there is peace, God is.

Love your neighbour, yet pull not down your hedge.

Whose house is of glass, must not throw stones at another.

The fat man knoweth not, what the lean thinketh.

Light burdens, long borne, grow heavy.

Every mile is two in winter.

An old dog barks not in vain.

Do not wait; the time will never be 'just right.' Start where you stand, and work with whatever tools you may have at your command, and better tools will be found as you go along.

God heals, and the Physician hath the thanks.

None knows the weight of another's burden.

Good & quickly seldom meet.

The book of books, the storehouse and magazine of life and comfort; the Holy Scriptures.


## History Corner: If a Map paints a thousand words...

The "empty plot"

It is fascinating to see the history of the St John's Church buildings reflected in the Ordnance Survey maps of the area, from different years. The wartime bombing of the large "third church" had resulted in the rather poignant empty plot shown on the 1951 map, though that wasn't entirely accurate, as the tower was still standing, and the building work on the fourth church was well underway, having started in 1950.

The 1951 map also shows that an extra building has appeared in the churchyard - the parish hall, known affectionately as "Little St John's". Completed in 1949, it included kitchens, and a chapel for the congregation to use - since the bombing they had been meeting temporarily in a chapel in the Rectory. "Little St John's" was dedicated by the Bishop on the very day that the Diocese sent their permission for the building of the fourth church to commence.

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
